Manuel Acevedo is the Founder & CEO of HelpfulVillage.com, a UC Berkeley-affiliated company that helps older adults age in their own homes with support from their neighbors. Helpful Village serves tens of thousands of older adults across 25 states, with new Villages forming around the country each month. In 2020, during the COVID-19 pandemic, Aging 2.0 recognized Helpful Village as a top-10 global innovator in the fight against social isolation. Mr. Acevedo is committed to equipping Villages worldwide with the best tools to grow and make a meaningful impact in their local communities.

Mr. Acevedo holds a master's degree in Communication Systems (Computer Science) from EPFL Lausanne, Switzerland. According to the QS World University Rankings, EPFL ranked 14th globally across all fields in 2020/2021, while the Times Higher Education rankings placed EPFL 19th in the world for Engineering and Technology in 2020.

He launched the HelpfulVillage.com platform to help Villages operate efficiently and cost-effectively, enabling them to support organizations that help older adults age in place. In 2016, the company was recognized as one of the most promising startups at the University of California and was selected to join the UC Berkeley Launch Startup Accelerator that same year.

In 2021, Manuel founded a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization called Healthy Aging Villages for All (www.villagesforall.org), which aims to bring the benefits of the Village Movement to diverse neighborhoods. The organization's philosophy is that all older adults—regardless of ethnic background or socioeconomic status—should be able to age with dignity and maintain social engagement and good health.

In 2022, Manuel was awarded an American Society on Aging Rise Fellowship in recognition of his contributions to the field of aging and his efforts to promote diversity and inclusion.

Jerry **Zuniga**




Zaire Sims
